Mr. Fridley worked for Riddle's Service and opened the station with his lear. The furnace was found on his key. The furnace was found on at full capacity indicating that the boys had tried to warm up the office. A cardboard had been placed over the cold air intake which caused the

gas to form carbon monoxide.
