in 1887, renting a small warehouse at the rear of the Murphy-Maclay ardware store. Strain came from Minot where he was a partner in a store with an older brother, J. H. Strain. The latter opened a store in Anaconda later.

After the store was started here, another brother, W. J. Strain, who had been associated with a North Dakota bank, joined the staff. Herbert Strain remained principal owner and active manager of the organization until his death in 1912.

The firm was incorporated in 1914 with W. J. Strain as president. He held that position until his retirement in 1920 when he sold his stock to Mrs. Herbert Strain and her sons, W. R. Strain and A. W. Strain.

Since Herbert Strain became a factor in the business life of this community, the institution he founded has undergone an expansion more than keeping pace with the industrial and agricultural development of the state.

Rapid growth of the store neces-sitated several moves from the first location. In 1890 a move was made to the Dunn block on Central avenue between Second and Third streets. In 1891, the grocery section of the store was moved to the Mc-Knight building where the Liberty

Need for additional floor space forced a move in 1895 to the Phelps block where the Steel building now stands on Third street.

In 1901, the W. G. Conrad building, site of the present store, was purchased to house the drygoods section. The grocery and hardware departments continued operation in

Herbert Strain started the store ing agent in 1934 for the Sears Roebuck firm. Strain Bros. was one of only five companies in the nation to hold sales franchises for the Sears company. Sears Roebuck goods were carried in the Strain Bros. basement.

For a time a grocery store was operated in a building at the rear of the main store, and a warehouse and service station operated across the alley from the main building. organization until his death in 1913. The grocery was closed later.
