Baruch Demands That Mason Make Good on Copper Steal Charges

ACCUSER THEN REPEATS CLAIM, INCREASES SUM

"You and Associates Stole \$200,000.00," Reply to Former Head War Industries Board.

Will Ask Next Attorney General to Prosecute, Illinoisan Declares in Letter.

Washington, June 2.—Dr. M. Baruch, former chairman of the war industries board, wrote to Representative Mason, Republican of Illinois, Wednesday asking that he be prosecuted for the alleged theft of \$200,000 from the government.

Dr. Baruch's accusation that the government was defrauded of \$200,000 is the second time he has made such a charge against the government. In a letter to the attorney general, dated June 1, 1919, he charged that the government had lost \$200,000 through the negligence of the war industries board.

DIES IN AUTO WRECK ON BELT ROAD WHEN STEER GEAR BREAKS

Accident Occurs When Physician and Five Sisters From St. Thomas Orphan Home Are Returning From Picnic Given by Nurses From Great Falls Hospital; Sister Edgar Is Injured When Machine Rolls Over Embankment, Four Others Not Hurt; Disaster Happens Near Highway Ranch Ten Miles From Town About 10 O'clock Wednesday Night.

Dr. F. J. Adams, 103 Third avenue north, was killed and Sister Edgar, superior of the St. Thomas orphan home, suffered severe bruises about the body, when the car in which they were returning to Great Falls last night from a picnic at Belt turned turtle about 10 miles from the city. Four other sisters from the orphan home, who were also in the car, were uninjured. The party had been to Belt to the picnic Wednesday afternoon, which had been given by some of the nurses of Great Falls hospital. They began the return trip from that place shortly after dark. When a few miles out from Belt, the steering gear became loosened and Dr. Adams went to a nearby farm house and sent a call to Great Falls for an auto mechanic to fix the car.

Washington, June 2.—The sugar investigating committee, in a majority report presented to the house Wednesday declared that Attorney General Palmer had used his power as chief prosecuting officer of the government "for the purpose of fixing maximum selling prices of sugar in Louisiana and in so doing, acted wholly without authority of law and in violation of his own construction of his official duty."
