This four-square hip-roofed house is very common in Butte. Called the "workingman's cottage" by a housing catalogue, it was erected quickly and cheaply to house workers in a variety of regions across the country. These homes in Butte show a marked resemblance to the hip-roofed cottages found in many southern mill villages and company towns. Often clustered together, built by one company in a short period of time, individual examples are also scattered throughout the neighborhood.

# PAT E. SHEEHAN IS TAKEN BY DEATH

## 'Well Known and Promi- nent Mining Man Dies in Butte After Brief Illness.

Patrick E. Sheehan, aged 59 years, one of the well-known and highly respected mining men of Butte, died last evening at a local hospital after a brief illness. Mr. Sheehan had been a resident of this community for more than 34 years and his demise, a shock and surprise to all, is universally regretted by a large circle of sincere friends in various parts of Montana. For many years Mr. Sheehan was superintendent of the Tuolumne mine. About 18 months ago he retired from this position and had devoted his time to traveling in the west and northwest. While not wealthy, Mr. Sheehan possessed means and his retirement from mining closed an eminently successful career. He was born in New York and coming west located in the Black Hills of South Dakota. He engaged in mining there and in about 1880 came to the treasure state. Since that time he had resided here almost continuously.

Mr. Sheehan is survived by his wife, who is on her way to Butte from Seattle; a stepson and two step daughters; brothers, Michael and John Sheehan of Butte, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Cummings and Mrs. Katie Rogers in New York.

No arrangements will be made for the funeral until the arrival of Mrs. Sheehan.

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## WOMAN ARRESTED FOR FAILURE TO REGISTER

Mrs. Dora Wehman, a native of Austria and the wife of a German, was arrested yesterday by Police Detective Joseph Williams at her home at 210 North Jackson street on a charge of not registering as an enemy alien. She was released shortly afterward by an agent of the department of justice, after she had promised to appear at a hearing Saturday at the office of the department in the post office building.

She said that her former husband was a native of Bohemia and a naturalized American and that she didn't know that by becoming the wife of a German subject she had lost the American citizenship acquired by the earlier marriage. Her first husband is dead and she remarried five months ago. She said she had a son in the United States army at Vancouver, Wash.

Detective Williams said last night

that about 20 German and Austrian women who had registered as enemy aliens had not called for their identification booklets, without which they are in danger of arrest.

## ELEVEN JOIN MARINES THUS FAR THIS WEEK

The local marine recruiting station last night sent to Missoula for final examination Charles C. Mathis, who has been a farmer of Cliff Lake, Madison county. This makes 11 so far this week, and Sergeant Bradbury said that he expects to send about four recruits away today, among them Arthur H. Ouellette, a truck driver of this city. Already the new rule prohibiting the release of men from the draft for enlistment in the marines is having an effect in cutting down the number of recruits.

<p>Further proof that the two men arrested Saturday night as the alleged holdup artists of a soft-drink parlor at 217 South Arizona street about 8:30 that evening, were engaged in a series of holdups in Butte during the last few weeks, was secured by Assistant Chief of Police James Larkin early yesterday morning, he said. The men, Frank Sylvester and Jack Dunn, were positively identified by</p>	<p>Tom Ottenso of Meaderville as the pair who bound and gagged him early one morning about six weeks ago in his home in Meaderville and robbed him of \$2, he told Larkin this morning.</p> <p>Ottenso was called to the door of his establishment at 25 Harrison street, Meaderville, by two men, who claimed they wanted some breakfast. When Ottenso opened the door he</p>	<p>was quickly secured and bound and gagged with a towel. The robbery yielded only \$2, however.</p> <p>The two men arrested last night had been under the surveillance of Assistant Chief of Police Larkin for the last 10 days. When Larkin arrested Dunn in an East Park street cigar store about an hour after the robbery Saturday night, he immediately questioned the man on the whereabouts of Sylvester. Dunn refused an answer, but the night chief was already aware that Sylvester was Dunn's brother-in-law, and resided at 210 North Jackson street. A quick call at the home resulted in the arrest of Sylvester, who has since been identified as Dunn's companion in the holdup of the place at 217 South Arizona street, another soft-drink parlor at 729 Utah avenue the night of Jan. 22, when \$108 was stolen, and the robbery of Tom Ottenso in Meaderville, six weeks ago, police said last night.</p>
